TKMG meeting and Annual General with special dual presentations at 7pm, Thursday 4th October at Malanda Hotel

The October meeting of Tree-kangaroo and Mammal Group will be a very special Annual General Meeting with a difference. In addition to the announcement of recipient of the 2018 William T. Cooper award, there will be two fascinating presentations following the Annual General Meeting. The first presentation will be on the *Malanda Wildlife Watch Project* by 10 year old local student, Macey Hales. This project is part of the Cairns District Science and Sustainability Enrichment program which is hosted by the Tinaroo Environmental Education Centre. The project aims, over 12 months, to raise awareness

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about our local native wildlife amongst the students at Malanda Primary School. Macey has been using some of our TKMG remote cameras to capture images from various locations and help teach students about species that are commonly found in the Malanda area.

Following Macey's report, you'll get to learn about research being carried out on the spotted-tail quoll populations in the Wet Tropics by ecologist and University of the Sunshine Coast Masters student, Jesse Rowland, as he tells us about his research on the elusive spotted-tail quoll (*Dasyurus maculatus gracilis*) in upland areas of the Wet Tropics.

TKMG will also be formerly announcing an exciting new project, "Critter Camera Library". TKMG will have 5 sets of remote cameras available for loan to current financial members of TKMG. The cameras will enable interested members to learn more about the 'secret' lives of wildlife in their own back yards. Full details on the project will be provided at the meeting.

This year has been very hectic and made more so for me by spending two months across the top of Australia via the Sandover Highway and the Tanami Track to the Kimberley Region in WA. A terrific experience thoroughly enjoyed with one highlight an exceptional sighting of a Monjon (*Petrogale burbidgei*) at the Mitchell Falls area (our smallest rock wallaby, just 30 cm long with a bushy tail tip).

I am very grateful to Committee members for picking up the slack while I was away, especially our Vice-President Amy Shima and grants supremo Dave Hudson. I was sorry to miss Jim Thomas's presentation in June and am pleased to see that the film *Into the Jungle* will be featured in Malanda on the 8th September. It was wonderful that Jim received the 2018 Biodiversity Award from the Prince Albert of Monaco Foundation in June this year, and fellow Australian Professor Terry Hughes of James Cook University received the 2018 Climate Change Award at the same ceremony.

The launch of Kimberley, our Virtual Reality tree kangaroo was a key part of the Open Day at the Malanda Visitor Centre on the 21st July. Many people enjoyed the experience and we appreciate Aidan Possemeirs, the JCU research student who developed the software,

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attending the opening. Several members turned up to take part in the activities. I was pleased to meet Jazmyn Pease for the first time – the Malanda school girl who came up with the great initiative of providing re-usable cloth bags for shoppers at the Malanda Spar (Jaz Bagz). Leadership from the young people in our region! Great to see. Another such leader is Macey Hales who has been developing and running a wildlife awareness project at Malanda School. Macey believes that people will more likely love and protect animals that they know so she is helping explore local wildlife at the school using wildlife cameras. There will be a chance to find out more about this innovative project directly from Macey who will be giving us a brief talk at the AGM this year. Hats off to Malanda School for supporting such excellent projects. It was also good to see Terrain and WTMA well represented at the open day along with other community groups including TREAT and BirdLife. The Mayor was present and I took the opportunity to remind him of our TKMG proposal that the Lumholtz's Tree Kangaroo be adopted as the official mammal emblem for the Tablelands Regional Council. If any members have a chance to raise this with your own local councillor in the TRC area, please do so. It is surprising to me that the Council does not leap at this opportunity for some positive media interest.

At our August meeting, we held a forum/workshop to put together member ideas for our submission to the Senate Inquiry into Australia's Extinction Crisis. It was excellent to see so many members offering great suggestions for the submission and since then we have put together a lengthy document within which we express our concerns about the current situation and propose various ideas as recommendations for the future. Changes to the EPBC Act have weakened protection and action on threatened species and we now have the strange situation that few of our threatened species actually have a recovery plan and even those that do have a plan have no funds to implement it. Giving Ministerial discretion on such matters has been regressive. Clearly this issue is not being taken seriously by Governments in Canberra and funds remain wholly inadequate. The closing date for submissions was extended until September 10th and it would be valuable if members submitted private comments that might help the Inquiry deliver a good outcome for wildlife.

Thanks to the members who made suggestions about possible recipients of the William T Cooper Award for 2018. The Committee will be considering options at our next meeting and members will find out more at the AGM in October. I would **very much** encourage members who felt so inclined to nominate for positions on the Committee. A healthy organisation needs turnover at the helm and cannot be effective without strong member interest in its survival. One great way to help is to join the Committee and take on a role that suits your interests. We will also be developing some volunteer roles for members who may have special skills but limited free time.

If you have a chance do drop in to the TKMG booth at the Yungaburra Markets and see some of the work we undertake. And maybe pick up one of our shopping bags! I very much

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appreciate the work of Simon Burchill and Ceinwen Edwards in keeping this public face of our group going. Meantime I look forward to seeing many of you at our AGM in October.


'Kimberley' visits the Ekka

The Queensland Government provided a \$10,000 Engaging Science Grant towards the development of the 3D virtual reality tree-kangaroo and recently invited TKMG to demonstrate Kimberley for 3 days at the Ekka (the RNA Show in Brisbane). We would be part of the Advance Queensland stand, along with other VR experiences. As our equipment is

installed at the Malanda Falls Visitor Centre, Aidan Possemiers (JCU/TensorWorks) agreed to make his equipment available. Fortunately AQ had some funds available to meet "staff" and travel costs, so Aidan was able to make the trip to Brisbane to run the demo. I was in Brisbane at the time and was able to attend for some of time as backup. Silly me thought I'd be sitting around twiddling my fingers most of the

time but after a slow first hour we were flat out with a steady stream of Ekka-goers of all ages; the first Friday being especially busy with primary school groups. Our new bookmarks (special thanks to Leanne for organizing them and to Jane Hopkinson for allowing us to use one of her great tree-kangaroo photos) were

Update on Kenny Road Fauna Rope Ladder

You may remember from the previous issue of Mammal Mail that the camera monitoring the Kenny Road Fauna Overpass rope ladder was on hold as the Ergon crew had to go to another job before they could finish the installation. Overcoming unexpected delays and challenges

(including the solar panel power unit proving to be incompatible with the camera!), and with enthusiastic and professional help from the crew from Energy QLD (formerly Ergon) the monitoring camera is now installed and operational. The camera is a Reconyx Microfire which can be accessed from the ground via Bluetooth and the Reconyx app so images can be downloaded and camera settings adjusted without anyone having to get to the camera itself. TKMG would welcome hearing from anyone

On-going volunteer opportunities:


